RECOMMENDATION

CONCLUSION

The crime statistics for the month of December 2012 reflect a decrease in Crimes Against the Person of (-4.7%) compared to December 2011, while Crimes Against Property show a (-9.7%) decrease compared to December 2011. Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property show a combined year-to-date reduction of (-8.7%).

BACKGROUND

Each month, reports providing statistics for the City of Regina are provided to the Crime Prevention Advisory Committee for their review and information. This report will provide statistics for the month of December 2012.

DISCUSSION

Crimes Against Property reflect a decrease of (-1130) reported incidents over 2011, for an overall year-to-date decrease of (-9.7%). We have seen a decrease of (-801) reported incidents of Theft Under \$5000 for a (-14.9%) decrease. There are (-134) fewer reported incidents of Mischief / Wilful Damage for a (-5%) decrease.

Thefts of Auto rates have increased by 1 incident for an overall increase of 0.1 % in our year-to-date statistics. The Regina Police Service in conjunction with its partners in the Stolen Auto Strategy continues to pay constant attention to this issue.

Crimes Against the Person reflect a year-to-date decrease of (-143) fewer incidents over December 2011, for a (-4.7%) decrease. There were 12 reported Robberies in December for a year-to-date decrease of (-49) incidents or a reduction of (-15.4%).

Overall the Regina Police Service has received (-1273) fewer reported incidents of Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property combined in 2012 over 2011 incidents for an (-8.7%) decrease.

There were a total of 4458 dispatched calls for service in December for a year-to-date reduction of (-2.7%) and alarm calls for service show a year-to-date decrease of (-12.2%).

CONCLUSION

The crime statistics for the month of January 2013 reflect a decrease in Crimes against the Person of (-15.6%) compared to January 2012, while Crimes against Property show a (-21.6%) decrease compared to January 2012. Crimes against the Person and Crimes against property show a combined year to date reduction of (-20.2%).

BACKGROUND

Each month, reports providing statistics for the City of Regina are provided to the Crime Prevention Advisory Committee for their review and information. This report will provide statistics for the month of January 2013.

DISCUSSION

Crimes against property reflect a decrease of (-162) reported incidents over 2012, for an overall year to date decrease of (-21.6%) We have seen a decrease of (-23) reported incidents of theft under \$5,000 for a (-7.2%) decrease. There are (-31) fewer reported incidents of Mischief / Wilful Damage for a (-19.9%) decrease.

Thefts of Auto rates have decreased by (-13) incidents for an overall decrease of (-21.7%) in our year-to-date statistics. The Regina Police Service in conjunction with its partners in the Stolen Auto Strategy continues to pay constant attention to this issue.

Crimes against the Person reflect a year-to-date decrease of (-33) fewer incidents over January 2013 for a (-15.6%) decrease. There were 19 reported robberies in January for a year-to-date increase of 7 incidents or an increase of 58.3%.

Overall the Regina Police Service has received (-195) fewer reported incidents of Crimes Against the Person and Crimes Against Property combined in 2013 over 2012 incidents for a (-20.2%) decrease.

There were a total of 4,492 dispatched calls for service in January for a year-to-date reduction of (-3.6%) and alarm calls for service show a year-to-date increase of 2.2%.

CONCLUSION

There were 18,594 police-reported crimes in Regina in 2012, which was 7.6% fewer than in 2011 and 35.0% fewer than in 2003 (excluding traffic and CDSA offences). This was Regina's lowest annual crime count over the last 10 years. The categories of Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against the Person were also ten year lows. More specifically, Assault, Robbery, Kidnapping/Forcible Confinement, Mischief/Willful Damage and Break and Enter occurrences were also ten year lows.

BACKGROUND

Twice each year, once at mid-year and once at year-end, the Regina Police Service provides an analysis of reported crime in Regina over the previous ten-year period. This report compares data compiled from January 1 to December 31 for the period of 2003 through 2012. The report is being forwarded to the Crime Prevention Advisory Committee for information purposes.


Measuring crime statistics over time is effective for identifying trends. Data is gathered in the same manner each year to ensure the analysis is reliable. Absolute crime counts, rather than crime rates or crime severity, are the basis of this analysis.

These statistics are not intended for comparison with other jurisdictions that may use different methodologies or have different reporting criteria.

DISCUSSION


Total Crime¹

There was 7.6% less total reported crime in 2012 than in 2011 and 34.8% less than in 2003.




Crimes Against the Person

The total number of reported Crimes Against the Person decreased by 4.7% from 2011 and by 23.3% from 2003.




¹ Total reported crime includes Crimes Against the Person, Crimes Against Property, and Other Criminal Code Violations.

There were 7 Homicides and 8 Attempted Murders in 2012. The average number of Homicides per year over this ten-year period was 7.7 and the average number of attempted murders was 12.6.




Total reported Assault² decreased by 0.9% from 2011 and by 12.9% from 2003.




² Assault 1, or common assault, occurs when one person applies force or threatens to apply force to another person. This may include gestures, physical pushing or a threatening act and often results in little to no physical harm to the victim. Assault 2, or assault with a weapon or causing injury, occurs when there is an injury to the victim either caused by force of another person or the result of a weapon. Assault 3, or aggravated assault, is the most severe type of assault which causes serious injury to the victim that may endanger their life.

The total number of Sexual Offences increased by 20.9% compared to 2011. Sexual Assault³ increased by 22.1% from 2011 but decreased by 18.8% from 2003. Of note, the Regina Police Service partnered in a public sexual assault prevention campaign called "Don't be that Guy" in Regina from July to September 2011. The goal of the campaign was to increase education about alcohol facilitated sexual assault and encourage victims to report these incidents to police.




There was a 15.4% decrease in Robbery from 2011 and a 50.8% decrease from 2003. Reducing street robberies was identified as a focus in the 2011-2014 Strategic Plan. As a result, the Regina Police Service developed a Robbery strategy that came into effect January 2013.



³ The crime category Sexual Assault includes Sexual Assault, Sexual Assault with a Weapon, and Aggravated Sexual Assault.


There were 8 occurrences of Kidnapping / Forcible Confinement in 2012 which was the lowest number over the last decade and well below the average of 23.7.

There were 25 occurrences of Criminal Harassment/Stalking in 2012 which was the lowest since 2005. When appropriate, the Domestic Violence Coordinator works with the victim and Family Services Regina to lay charges of Criminal Harassment / Stalking in attempts to protect victims from further abuse.




Crimes Against Property


The number of reported Crimes Against Property decreased by 9.7% from 2011 and 47.6% from 2003.




There was one more incident of Motor Vehicle Theft in 2012 compared to 2011. Over the last decade there has been a reduction of 60.8% in the number of reported occurrences. This trend in part demonstrates the continued success of the Regina Auto Theft Strategy.




With the exception of an increase from 2010 to 2011, there was a decrease in total Theft each year in the last decade. Compared to 2011, there was a decrease of 14.5% and 45.0% in the past decade.




Total Break and Enter occurrences decreased by 9.7% from 2011, with decreases in each structural category. Over the last decade, there has been a decrease of 64.3%.



The number of reported Mischief / Willful Damage occurrences decreased by 5.0% from 2011 to 2012 and 31.9% since 2003. There were 356 incidents of Graffiti (a sub-category of Mischief) in 2012, which remains relatively stable over the last few years. Incidents of Graffiti accounted for 14.0% of all Mischief incidents in 2012.




The 62 Arson occurrences in 2012 were well below the ten-year average of 84.8.




Other Criminal Code Violations

There were 3.8% fewer Other Criminal Code⁴ occurrences than in 2011 but 12.4% more than in 2003. The spike in 2004 was due to a high number of Counterfeiting Currency occurrences.




⁴ The crime category Other Criminal Code Violations includes: procedural violations, offensive weapons violations, prostitution, counterfeiting currency, and gaming and betting.

Procedural violations make up a large portion of Other Criminal Code violations. Breach of Probation, Fail to Attend Court, and Bail Violations combined to account for 87.3% of all Other Criminal Code violations in 2012.




There were three more occurrences of Prostitution in 2012 than in 2011 and an increase of 45.7% over the decade.




Controlled Drugs & Substances Act (CDSA) & Traffic

The number of CDSA occurrence was virtually unchanged from 2011 but there were 101.7% more than in 2003. The increase in CDSA occurrences from 2004 to 2005 was related to the creation of a Special Enforcement Team (SET) and, shortly after, the Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit (CFSEU), as well as organizational restructuring in the Regina Police Service's Criminal Investigation Division (CID).




The total number of Traffic occurrences under the Criminal Code or Highway Traffic Act decreased by 3.3% compared to last year. Since 2003, however, there has been an increase of 43.3%.


Previous to 2009, reports of unexplained vehicular damage were taken as the Criminal Code offence 'Failure to Stop or Remain' (hit and run). Following a best practices review and consultation with SGI, such reports are no longer classified as a criminal hit and run unless evidence exists of intent to flee the scene of a vehicular collision by an offending party. Instead, most of these reports now fall under the Highway Traffic Act offence 'Fail to Report MVA/Property Damage.'



The number of Impaired Drive occurrences decreased by 2.8% from 2011. However, there were 8.0% more than in 2003. The higher number of Impaired Drive occurrence can partially be attributed to increased enforcement efforts and partnerships between the Regina Police Service and SGI, such as the Enforcement Overdrive and Report Impaired Drivers (RID) programs.




The number of Traffic Tickets⁵ issued in 2012 was the highest in the past ten years. There were 1.9% more than in 2011 and 63.3% more than in 2003.



Calls for Service

There were 2.7% fewer Calls for Service than in 2011 and 5.3% fewer than in 2003.

Alarm Calls decreased by 12.2% from 2011, continuing the annual reductions that have occurred since the Regina False Alarm Bylaw went into force in 2005.



⁵ The category Tickets Issued includes Red Light Traffic Tickets but excludes Inspection Tickets and 24 Hour, 30 Day, and 90 Day Suspensions.

Population

According to Statistics Canada's 2011 Canadian Census, the city of Regina's population was 193,100 in 2011, an increase of 7.7% since the 2006 Census and 9.1% since the 2001 Census. Population counts factor into the calculations of the Crime Rate and Crime Severity Index, both of which are released by the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics in July.
